

If we are not convinced, let us look at those first disciples, who, immediately after encountering the gaze of Jesus, went forth to proclaim him joyfully: "We have found the Messiah!" (John 1:41)

Sisters in Christ/ Women of Faith

The Council of Catholic Women, CCW, has a long and caring history here at St. Patrick Catholic Church. The parish formed its first Catholic Wom-

en's Guild in 1959. We proudly maintain 2 Circles of the CCW working well as a team in fund raising for our different charities and helping the parish with needed items.

I am sure you have seen our ladies after Sunday morning masses selling coffee and doughnuts in the social hall or manning the religious articles "store", or outside the main building selling pecans in the fall. We have bake sales and host a Victorian Tea and these fund raisers allow us to sponsor our youth to attend retreats and camps, host dinners for seniors (Circle 7) and help our Church purchase much needed items during the year. We also organize the Annual Indoor Thrift Sale with proceeds going to the church. Our Circle 1 ladies organize Mary's Way of the Cross and the Patriotic Rosary annually and our yearly blanket drive.

Our monthly meetings find us saving can tabs for Shriner's Children's hospital or pennies for priests (for vocations) or our loose change for Water for Life, which is a much needed ministry to third world countries (for Daughters of Mary in Tanzania). We collect shoes and socks for the migrants, used eyeglasses for the Lion's Club and mother and baby items for Alpha House twice a year, at Christmas and in May for Mother's Day.

With the generosity of our members we have donated thousands of hours to various ministries. We participate in the Hugs for the Homeless campaign, Catholic days at the capitol (we send representatives to add our voice to those issues that are important to Catholic women), 40 Days for Life and hold monthly prayer and sign holding days at the abortion clinic. Recently we have even been able to activate our online prayer chain for those who have volunteered to pray for those requests.

Our passion and our faith run deep for our Church and our community. Our circles are made up of wonderful women with a varied array of talents. As more and more women hear the call of Our Lord and find their special place to serve him best, we are blessed that they choose to serve him in the CCW with other dedicated sisters in Christ.

Lest you think we are all work and no play, let me assure you that the ladies have a deep and abiding respect for each other and enjoy the company and fellowship that is offered and we share meals, stories, heartaches and happy news with each other and are always there with a good laugh, friendly smile and a warm hug!

Mutuality in Ministry By Fr Stan Holland, TOR and Susan Carpenter

This issue of The Shamrock is dedicated to our many ministries at St Patrick. View the many photographs of our people involved in serving the Lord by serving those in need. See the fulfillment of Matthew 26:31ff. What we do to the least of our brothers and sisters that we do to Jesus. "When I was hungry you gave me to eat; when I was thirsty you gave me to drink; when I was naked you clothed me; when I was sick and in prison you visited me." At times the corporal works of mercy we do can be thankless and exhausting. Sometimes we wonder if we are doing any good at all. Preachers often wonder if their words mean anything or do any good. l will always pray for someone who is sick, for God to heal them. Often I don't know what the results of my prayers are. But, once in a while, someone tells me God healed them of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, a large tumor has shrunk to near invisibility, a dying child recovers, a marriage is reconciled, employment is and gained. All at once it is like a shot in the arm. All at once the desire to serve the Lord is strengthened and we want to continue to serve Him by serving our brothers and sisters in need.

One such shot in the arm comes in the form of a letter by Susan Carpenter sharing her experience last year in the hospital. Her entire demeanor was recharged by the presence of the Body and Blood of Christ when Jesus visited her in the form of the Eucharist ministered to her by a Eucharistic minister from Christ the King Parish.

Susan writes:

"Recently I had the occasion to be admitted to the hospital on an emergency basis. I found myself in the ICU extremely dehydrated and not thinking at all clearly. Things were happening and decisions had to be made. I could barely understand the questions much less know the answers. I had sent my dear husband home as he could not accompany me to the ICU. I reached for a phone to call him. Oh no, I sent my phone home with him. No bedside phone in the ICU. The nurses are pushing for decisions. Chaos seemed to be surrounding me and I felt so alone. Then there was a soft male voice outside the cubicle. "This is Philip, from Christ the King. Would you like to receive Eucharist?" That sentence was like a life line. I grabbed on. I asked the nurses to leave us for a few minutes. Philip came into the cubicle, we prayed and I received Eucharist. Such a feeling of peace entered the area. I felt Jesus tell me to calm down, that He was in charge. The chaos left. The nurses came back in. One of them said. "What happened? There is such calmness in here." I just smiled and gave my OK for the procedures they wanted to do. If you ever doubt the importance of your ministry, or that God is working through you please remember my witness. To me, on that day, Philip brought more than he could ever know."

Eucharistic Ministers to the Homebound

A picture is worth a thousand words... each visit to the Homebound of our Parish and local nursing homes is priceless. Who adopted who? Who is richer for receiving the companionship and message in our ministry, including those who are not Catholic?

One of our pictures shows us entertaining for Christmas at South Tampa Rehab. The Nursing Homes have come to depend on us, and they ask us to entertain.

During this ministry we often make special At Bayshore Point we met friends. William, a World War II veteran, very weak and confined to a wheel chair. Yet he was always present at our weekly prayer service and joined in Communion, He responded to Communion with a touching smile. This week he was not at the weekly service, and we learned that he had died. We miss our friend William, but we take great comfort knowing that, through our efforts, William prayerfully received the sacraments in the final weeks of his life.

The Gospels urge us to care for the

sick. The purpose of this ministry is to provide a sacramental lifeline to those who cannot attend Holy Mass and Communion. With the participation of Fr. Jim, Fr. Stan and Fr. Angelus we have renewed the Homebound Ministry.

A year ago there were too few ministers that had too many people to serve. We are now 12 ministers strong and growing! We visit 80 patients in 3 Nursing homes, and another 12 parishioners in their homes, on a weekly basis.

If you know of a homebound parishioner, or nursing home resident, deserving a visit, let us know.

Please consider the call of the homebound ministry. You are welcome to come along with us for a visit or two, before you make the commitment to be a minister to the homebound. Our ministers to the homebound serve two hours per week, and it helps if they have a car. We always work in teams. The Giving Tree

The Advent Season is a time for preparation and for awaiting the arrival of "JOY". We look forward to the "gift" of the Birth of the Lord. We prepare ourselves for the Holidays; families and friends get together and share many moments and exchange gifts. Our "Giving Tree" has become a source of Joy for many in our community. The community shares the "Spirit of Christmas" with others by providing a gift for those who might not get one during the holidays. We share our Love and the Love of Christ with the 'least of our brothers and sisters'. They become the face of Christ for us and the smiles on their faces when they receive the gifts fill our hearts with the JOY of Christmas.

Posada

Imagine Mary and Joseph going to Bethlehem and looking for a place to stay... Posadas are a re-creation of a search for a place to stay here in South Tampa – in our own neighborhood – during nine days prior to Christmas Day. A group of parishioners would bring statues of Mary, Joseph and the Baby Jesus to a place; it is usually a home chosen in advance. Upon arriving we have a dialogue in song asking for shelter. One group asks for shelter and another group will respond negatively; the dialogue continues until the "family" is allowed to enter. We then recite some opening prayers, read from the Holy Scriptures (St. Luke Chapter 1), we share the meaning of the scripture passage or our personal feelings, we sing the O Antiphons, we pray the Holy Rosary and we sing carols. After the religious celebration, the host family shares with all visitors food and beverages appropriate of the Season. The host family is asked to bring the Holy Family figures to the next home to be visited until we complete our nine days. The Posadas are typical of Mexico; we have modified it with special Puerto Rican traditional holiday music and merriment.

Imagínense a La Virgen María y su esposo San José llegando a Belén en busca de un lugar donde albergarse... Las Posadas son una recreación de esa búsqueda pero aquí en el Sur de Tampa en nuestro propio vecindario durante nueve noches antes del día de Navidad. Un grupito de la comunidad trae unas estatuas de La Virgen, San José y el Niñito Jesús a un hogar escogido de antemano. Allí hacemos un dialogo musical donde los de afuera piden posada y los de adentro se la niegan hasta que al fin se le permite a La Familia que entre. Al entrar hacemos algunas oraciones, leemos de las Sagradas Escrituras (San Lucas Capitulo 1), compartimos el mensaje que nos tren las escrituras o como nos sentimos en ese momento, cantamos las Preces, rezamos el Santo Rosario y cantamos algunas canciones propias de la Navidad. Luego la familia anfitriona comparte con todos los visitantes comidas y refrescos propios de la estación. Se le pide a la familia que traiga las figuritas de La Sagrada Familia a la próxima casa que vamos a visitar la siguiente noche. Las Posadas son típicas de México; nosotros les hemos dado algunos matices Puertorriqueños y nuestra alegría.
