St. Patrick Pentecost Celebration

We celebrated Easter Sunday – The Resurrection of The Lord, one of the most important celebrations of our Church and the Liturgical Year. Baptism

Confirmation

The Sacrament of Confirmation is a sacrament in which the Holy Spirit is given to those already baptized in order to make them strong and perfect Christians, followers of Jesus Christ and defenders of the Faith.

Confirmation means accepting responsibility for your faith and destiny. The focus is on the Holy Spirit, who confirmed the apostles on Pentecost and gave them courage to practice their faith. Catholics believe that same Holy Spirit confirms Catholics during the Sacrament of Confirmation and gives them the same gifts and fruits.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

We would like to Welcome Shannon Brace, Meghan French, Emily Kron, Christine McVeety, and Mitchell Martin, to the fullness of our Catholic Faith.

The acronym "RCIA" is short for the "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults," the document flowing from Vatican II that guides the process by which adults are initiated into our Roman Catholic community. The RCIA describes a never ending journey in which those called by Christ to enter into a deeper relationship with Him guided and cared for as they awaken in faith and are introduced to the Sacramental life of the Body of Christ, the Church.

The RCIA process is a series of carefully planned pillars, marked by liturgical rites in the presence of the whole community, in which new Catholics embark on and join us in a continuing and deepening conversion into faith, evangelization and discipleship. The RCIA takes the distinctive history and spiritual needs of each person into account, differentiating between the baptized and the unbaptized, the catechized and the uncatechized. The needs of mature, practicing Christians from other faith traditions are also embraced and nourished.
